But ask new media artist Ruth West how ATLAS in silico works and she explains it like this: "It's a virtual reality world created from data from the Global Ocean Survey. This is data from the world's oceans and we've presented it in a virtual reality world made from the data itself."

Take it from us, it's cool. With 3D glasses on, you experience different patterns, which emerge to "float" beside you, all to a soundtrack of the murmured data.

It came about when Ms West, who has a background in molecular genetics, noticed the massive number of computers being used by scientists analysing ocean DNA.

They offered her the data and two years later the project had been completed by 19 artists, composers and computing scientists.

"We're interested in the ways we're digitising nature and extracting nature as these digital data," Ms West said. "Both in arts and sciences we make meaning and knowledge through generating patterns and interpreting patterns.

"That's part of the experience we were seeking to create." The work is being shown for the first time outside the US at MOFO, which continued at Mona and around town yesterday.

More than 4000 were expected in the museum grounds, where Faith No More frontman Mike Patton's tetema headlined last night.
